Brief Assessment Of The Witkoff–Dmitriev 28-point Russia-Ukraine Peace Plan

This assessment of the Witkoff–Dmitriev 28-point Russia-Ukraine plan is based on the inventory prepared by Eerik N. Kross, former Intelligence Director of Estonia and Member of Parliament.

71 Obligations the Plan Would Breach

1. Territorial Integrity & Non-Recognition of Aggression (14 Obligations)

Violates:

- UN Charter (Article 2(4); jus cogens non-recognition)
- UNGA resolutions on Ukraine (68/262; ES-11/1; ES-11/4; ES-11/5)
- UN Friendly Relations Declaration (2625)
- Definition of Aggression (3314)
- OSCE Helsinki Final Act, Paris Charter, Istanbul & Astana commitments
- PACE Resolution 2605

Core breach: Forces U.S. recognition of Russia's territorial gains.

2. Sovereign Right to Choose Alliances (6 Obligations)

Violates:

- UNGA 2625 freedom to choose foreign policy
- OSCE Helsinki, Paris, Istanbul, Astana commitments no spheres of influence

Core breach: Imposes a Russian veto on Ukraine's NATO future and forces alliance restrictions.

3. Prohibition of Aggression & Duty Not to Reward It (11 Obligations)

Violates:

- Nuremberg Charter & Principles
- UN Charter; UNGA ES-11/1, ES-11/4; UNGA 3314
- ILC Articles 40–41 (non-recognition; no assistance; duty to end breach)
- PACE 2605

Core breach: Treats aggression as legitimate, normalizing the results of an illegal war.

4. Prohibition of Amnesty for War Crimes (15 Obligations)

Violates:

- Geneva Conventions (Common Art. 1; grave-breach prosecution duties)
- Customary IHL Rule 158
- Convention Against Torture (Articles 4–7)
- Nuremberg Principles (no immunity; no political override)
- UN practice rejecting amnesty for core crimes
- PACE 2605

Core breach: Imposes blanket amnesty for war crimes, torture, and mass atrocities.

5. Victims' Right to Justice & Reparations (7 Obligations)

Violates:

- UN Basic Principles on Remedy and Reparation
- UNGA ES-11/5
- Council of Europe Register of Damage framework

Core breach: Extinguishes victims' claims and diverts frozen assets away from reparations.

6. Sanctions, Non-Normalisation & Accountability (9 Obligations)

Violates:

- UNGA-mandated non-recognition of annexations
- G7/EU/NATO commitments tying sanctions to withdrawal and accountability
- PACE 2605 requirements

Core breach: Restores Russia to the G8, ends pressure prematurely, and normalizes aggression.

7. North Atlantic Treaty Violations (9 Obligations)

Violates:

- **Article 10** Open-door membership policy
- Article 1 Inadmissibility of territorial gains from force
- **Article 2** Protection of free institutions
- NATO Summit declarations (open door; no vetoes)

• U.S. obligations as treaty depositary

Core breach: Requires the U.S. to dismantle NATO's open-door policy and subordinate it to Russia.

Conclusion for Decision-Makers

If the United States were to support the Witkoff–Dmitriev plan, it would:

- breach 71 separate international legal and political obligations,
- contradict every major Ukraine-related vote the U.S. has cast since 2014,
- undermine core norms of the post-1945 order, and
- require the U.S. to partially invalidate the UN Charter, Geneva Conventions, and the North Atlantic Treaty in practice.

This is why the plan is legally indefensible, strategically destabilizing, and politically radioactive for any government that endorses it.
